The members of our needleworking group have loved some form of knitting, crocheting or needlepoint for decades, some of us since we were 8 years old! We first learned to sew as a life skill. Then, this art form took on a life of itself and we all became sewing enthusiasts.

We find stitching therapeutic and relaxing. It is our "mindful sewing." It helps to stimulate our minds and sustain great hand-eye coordination. We not only keep our hands busy, but we engage in wonderful conversation as well. It is our social hour.

We share our passion for sewing by donating pieces to certain groups in need. Many years ago, St. James Church right here in Hackettstown, was searching for knitters to donate hats, scarves, vests and gloves during Christmas time to The Seamen's Church Institute in Port Newark, NJ to assist the mariners when they are out to sea. We get our hands busy every year and "sew-n-send" cozy, warm clothes for when the ships dock in Newark. We also work with the organization Online Angels Charity in PA, where we donate knitted 8" fabric squares. Online Angels pieces the squares together to form afghan blankets, which we lovingly call "loveghans". They then facilitate the delivery of our donations across the country to children and veterans who have lengthy hospital stays and across the world to military in Afghanistan. We also ship boxes of sweaters, hats and blankets to World Vision International to assist in the care of displaced children across the globe.

Having the ability to continue our passion for knitting as a group and the opportunity to help so many in need around the world is wonderful. It is so enriching for us, and we are elated that we found one another at Heath Village.




The 'Orient Express'

The 'Orient Express' is a real train, I promise! I know first-hand as I have been on this iconic train.

I was thrilled when I learned that Heath Village was taking a road trip to the Papermill Playhouse theater in Millburn, NJ to see Agatha Christie's well known story *Murder on the Orient Express*. The story was adapted perfectly for the stage. I had a feeling this play would bring back many magical memories for me of my brief but meaningful time on The Orient Express, which I happily shared with the other residents who joined me for the show.

The Orient Express along with the story, *Murder on the Orient Express*, both have a long history in our society. The Orient Express embarked on its first journey back in 1883 leaving Paris and traveling to Vienna. This famous train is the setting for *Murder on the Orient Express* which was first published in 1934.



My husband Ray and I traveled on the Orient Express back in 2007 while we traveled through Europe. We anxiously waited to board the Venice-Simplon Orient Express which uses refurbished carriages dating back to the 1920s Orient Express train. The line was very long, and we didn't know if we would be able to board the train. We were the last ones in line and an attendant approached us and asked if we would like to ride in our own private room! We jumped at the opportunity. I remember how luxurious the dining & bar area were, decorated in these rich burgundy colors and the seating area was extremely comfortable. The gift shop was amazing and I fell in love with a beautiful pearl necklace, along with other pieces of jewelry displayed in the shop.

Moving on to our private room, we enjoyed our drinks – an old fashioned for myself and a single malt scotch for my husband – while we took in the beauty of the Alps while it was snowing. We were able to spend five glorious hours on board and I later found out my husband snuck off to the gift shop and purchased the gorgeous pearl necklace I admired earlier. It is such a meaningful momento of our time on the Orient Express together, which was the trip of a lifetime.

I wore the necklace when we went to the Papermill Playhouse for the show, and it was a big hit with my fellow residents. Remembering Our Fallen Heroes Heath Village's Memorial Day Ceremony

This year Heath Village held our 3rd Annual Memorial Day Ceremony. As with previous years, I had many residents volunteer to knit hand-made crocheted poppies. The residents made more than 200 poppy flowers which were displayed in the vestibule, lobby and on our large poppy blanket which is part of our *Wall of Remembrance* display outside of the Auditorium. Each poppy represents a life lost in war time – man, woman or animal. Red represents our veterans and purple represents animals. Poppy pins were once again sold in our Activities Department, and we collected close to \$300 this year. All the monies raised will be donated to the Friendship Fund.



Every year I pick a topic that I feel would interest the residents and this year was *Women in the Military*. While doing my research, I learned about some amazing women during wartime, such as Grace Murray Hopper who was in the United States Navy. Grace was a leading computer engineer and helped detect torpedoes during World War II. Also Ruby Bradley, a nurse who was a prisoner of war that delivered thirteen babies and hid her food rations to provide them to other captives while she was in captivity herself. We also touched on the fact that for a long-time, woman did not have the same rights as men in the military even though they were out on the battlefields fighting side by side. Thankfully due to changes in our military, men and women are now nearly equal in how they can serve their country and the recognition they receive.

Rolling Thunder Chapter 3NJ which is a non-profit organization who advocates for Prisoners of War (POW) and the Missing in Action (MIA), assisted me with giving the lecture and provided us a "Missing Man" table display which recognizes POW/MIA military. I believe everyone who attended the ceremony was astounded at the bravery and commitment women in our military have and continue to demonstrate.

It is my hope that by putting a visual aspect to the number of men, women and animals that lost their lives during wartime, folks will truly see the cost of our freedoms. During Memorial Day weekend, many enjoy the sales, a trip to the beach, family picnics and the three-day weekend, but it is also so important to take a moment to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Women Celebrating Women ~ Heath Village's Women's Association Spring Luncheon

Our Women's Association Spring Luncheon is a beloved and a highly anticipated annual event. The women of Heath Village look forward to gathering to connect, break bread and share in the abundance of our community.

This year the association added a twist to the event by inviting our CEO/Executive Director Mary Ellen Bove to provide a history about our village where she also initiated the very first Heath Village trivia game with some rather difficult questions! But our residents didn't get stumped and the first to guess the correct answer won a prize!



For example, one question was: How did Heath Village get its name?

Answer: It was named after the Heath family who came to Schooley's Mountain in 1979. Joseph Heath had built a hotel – Heath House – and it was the start of what was to become the fashionable Schooley's Mountain Resort in the 19th Century. Heath House grew so big that it could accommodate 300 quests. In 1830 John Heath opened a general store – the one that still exists today as the Schooley's Mountain General Store - and is known as the oldest general store in the state.

Mary Ellen also shared some fun facts about our community.

- In December 1966, the Residents' Council was formed.
- In March 1967 the first Garden Club meeting was held.
- In September 1967 the Village Shop opened.
- In November 1967 the Heath Village library opened.
- In February 1968 the first edition of the Voice (then known as the Heath Village newsletter) was published.

It was a perfect afternoon together where we all learned something new about Heath Village! We are so grateful that the Women's Association hosts this event yearly!
