Larger tanks held guitar fish (fiddler rays), flash (a long black spotted eel hiding in an artificial log), brightly colored lionfish, an axolotl - a whitish fish with what looked like six antlers sticking out of its head (truly a weird sight), some poison dart frogs of different colors, several kinds of rays (looking sort of like pancakes wiggling along the floor of the tank or floating along just under the surface.)


One striking exhibit presented some haunting jellyfish, translucent white and mysterious as they floated up and down in their habitat.

I was also able to meet their adorable free roaming donkeys! We continued south to visit the Giants Causeway, which required more than a mile hike to reach but was absolutely worth it. The causeway consists of over 40,000 columns of basalt rock!

We toured the spectacular Cliffs of Moher where Carmel reminisced about her time spent there with her three children on holiday. "I couldn't believe how greatly improved the grounds were since the last time I was here with my family," said Carmel. All this was not here when I would run around the cliffs with my children. I also walked the grounds of Blarney Castle in 1967 with my husband who kissed the Blarney Stone, which is supposed to give you the gift of gab. I didn't need any help in that department, so I decided to pass on kissing the stone. My husband and I drank Guinness, sang songs, and danced a few Irish jigs that evening just for the fun of it...such good memories for me," continued Carmel.

We continued to travel through Killarney where we were entertained at a castle with medieval music, dance, food and mead. When we arrived at the largest thatched roof building in Ireland, we had another wonderful feast with Irish singing and step dancing on our table to boot. No blarney!

We traveled from North to South and finished our tour where we started, in Dublin. We enjoyed a tour of the Guiness Factory where we had a great lunch and of course, a pint of Guinness to celebrate. Slainte!

We were thrilled to return to Heath Village and share our adventure with the residents by showing a slide show presentation filled with pictures from our trip during one of our popular happy hours at Paddy's Pub. It was the perfect ending to our journey of a lifetime.

It's Electric! Heath Village Gets "Greener"

Approximately two years ago, it became clear to Heath Village that it needed to begin planning for the newest generation of motor vehicles – the electric car. Not only had our first resident moved in with a hybrid vehicle, more and more prospects I was told were asking about the availability of charging stations on campus.

After getting approval from Heath Village, Diane Horner, Director of Maintenance, applied for a state grant to pay for the installation of two charging stations. Once we were awarded the grant, the challenge of selecting the right charging company for our community began. I contacted approximately ten state approved companies for quotes and responses to questions such as the annual cost to use the software network, maintenance costs, length of warranty, the type of internet connection required, how funds are collected and payment methods for charging.

After reviewing the information with administration and department heads, we agreed that we wanted the charging experience to be as simple as possible for residents. We found that the company Blink EV Charging best suited our needs.



Once the chargers were ordered, I met with our electrician to decide on the most practical locations for each charging station. We wanted to make the stations easily accessible for residents across the campus, so we picked two locations – one in lower campus by Heath House and one in upper campus, adjacent to the old health care center.

We were able to source electricity and provide power directly from our campus to facilitate the perfect environment for the charging stations. Following the site work, Blink EV Charging stepped in to designate the charger settings and finalize the power supply to each station. I received training on the software, conducted many test runs, worked through some technical issues, and finally got the stations up and running for use. Both charging stations are private, meaning they require an access card to utilize them. We knew this would keep the stations secure and in good condition for our residents and their family members.

Octavia "Tavia" Brown, one of the first residents to bring with her a hybrid car was happy to share her thoughts on the new addition. "In 2021 when I purchased my Subaru plug-in hybrid car, I felt righteously happy to be doing something useful for the environment. My excitement dwindled quickly when I realized that my new Heath Village home wasn't prepared for this new technology. However, after a series of setbacks (including me causing a power outage in my neighborhood when trying to charge my car in the carport), Heath Village is now the proud host of two charging stations! It takes just about an hour to fully charge my car and I'm now doing my bit for a greener world!! And in exchange, I get spectacular mileage."

We are very happy to offer this exciting amenity and to take another step toward a greener community.

New Adventures Await!



Earlier this year, Heath Village hiking enthusiasts and Heath Village staff partnered to refurbish our very own hiking and nature trail system located behind our homes in the upper campus.

Following the Voice article highlighting the development and maintenance of our hiking trails and our active hiking group, there was renewed enthusiasm among the residents in our trails. In response, the Hiking Club decided to develop guided trail walks for interested residents with a member from the Heath Village Hiking Group serving as the guide.

We offer the guided trail walks once a month and advertise the date in the Friday flyer distributed by the Activities Department. Participants decide the route(s) to be taken depending on group interest and abilities

when they gather for the hike. Our experienced resident trail guides assist in route selection and lead them through the newly marked and well-maintained trail system.

Our trails feature a variety of walking options ranging from short nature trails with gentle grades, to more challenging walks on steeper, longer trails. We also interconnect with the county-wide Patriot's Path Trail and our neighboring Cataract Falls Park. Since all the trails are interconnected, each hiker/walker can easily custom design their trek to meet their energy level and interest.


